## Central Indiana Division achieves Non Profit 501 (c) (3) status!

The Central Indiana Division NMRA recently completed an almost 2 year long journey to research, gather information, apply, respond to questions, and revise our Constitution to qualify for the Internal Revenue Services Non Profit Status. This application was made based on the role of the Central Indiana Division NMRA being an educational organization that promotes the hobby of model railroading. Examples of this role are seen in public displays of model railroading done in libraries and other community settings. It is accomplished when we do demonstrations and provide clinics on how to improve our model railroading skills.

What does this accomplish for the CID? There are two main benefits for our organization. If someone wishes to make a donation to the CID or wishes to donate part of their model railroad collection to the CID, they will be able to claim that donation on their federal tax form if they itemize their deductions. The CID will not be able to place a value on the donation unless the donation is a cash donation. The second benefit will be that Central Indiana Division Board Members and volunteers can document mileage expenses when traveling to CID events and can then deduct part of that expense on their taxes. There are specific requirements for this deduction that require each person to research if this is worthwhile for them and they should also likely consult with whoever helps them in doing their taxes to make sure that any deductions are for the appropriate amount. If you thought this article was complex, I'll gladly show you the 501 (c) (3) application!

Layouts...

As a basis of this article, I'm going to assume we – model railroaders – all have at least one of the following:

> 1) A layout (where you can operate/run trains),

2) Access to a layout (a club's or a friend's layout where you can operate/run trains),

3) The desire to build your own layout (where you can operate/run trains).

Personally, I feel that a layout, or access to one, is a necessity if you are going to be a model railroader. *AND* that layout needs to be a place where you can run your trains (good) or, hopefully, operate your trains in a realistic, prototypical manner (better). Why do I feel that way? Remember that we are modeling a transportation system that moves. That's the reason the system was built and remains - it moves goods from one location to an-

other. If we are to properly represent a part of that system, our models need to be able to move.

So, fellow model railroader, how's your layout? You have started building it, haven't you? Assuming the answer to the last question is "Yes," I'll ask, "You are continuing to work on it, aren't you?" I ask that because we all know a layout is never "finished." Thinking about trying to complete your layout may be daunting, but there are ways to get some work done for the cost of cans of pop and bags of snacks.

Our local group continues to work on four layouts on a round-robin basis. We are fortunate to have work sessions three times per week nearly every week with special sessions from time to time. Two afternoon sessions each week are filled with those of us who are now retired. Based on over thirty-five years of precedent, the group continues to meet one night per week. This evening session draws the most people. Of the four layouts, two are undergoing expansions. Another is well on the way to being "done" with work continuing on the signal system, adding details and structures, with operations not too far away. One layout is fairly new and the group has had a few work sessions there helping with some scenery and electrical work. This new layout is in the beginning stage of operations and we have provided the bodies to man the trains so the operations system can be tested. There is one other layout that is available from time to time. That layout is being used to further acquaint our members with operations. This system of work sessions seems to work well for our group. We are able to get together to enjoy each other's company and to share our skills with the other layout owners. They accept the help and we accept the snacks. It's a win-win situation.

How can this work for you? It will require a bit of management on your part to set this up for your layout. Have a look around the train room and make a list of what you'd like to get accomplished. Make sure you have adequate supplies (both model railroad and snack) on hand for those jobs and invite some of your model railroad friends over for a work session. Notice I said some of your friends. Don't overcrowd your available space. Having too many bodies in the way won't allow folks to move around as they try to get their work done. If you know the abilities of the individuals in your crew, assign duties to each of them based on what they are comfortable doing. If they need to bring tools, let them know ahead of time. Once they are there, remember it's your layout, so if there are specific ways you want things done, let the workers know. It's considerate to let them know before they begin. And listen if the worker has suggestions. They may know better ways to accomplish the task. But you do have final sav.

So get your lists of things to do and people to contact together and set up a time to continue the work on your railroad. Making progress on the layout will make you feel good and there's the possibility that some of your workers will go home and work on their own railroad. It's another win-win situation.

As work progresses on your railroad, let us know about it. We, the CID, are looking for (more than) a few good layouts for the 2016 *Highball to Indy* NMRA National Convention. #### And I thought I was done with the pass through gate.

#### A Counter Weight System

After I finished my pass through gate, I found that it would stay open and would be hanging in what will be the isle-way. When the gate was hung I thought it was level and it was..... when aligned with the tracks. But after it was free from the support it would swing on open itself.

So as a result I planned a counterweight system that we used on the plywood doors of our tents when I was in Kuwait a few years ago. Using a single pulley, rope, and water bottle, I attached an eye hook to the outside corner of the gate and the pulley from the main support of the gate and filled the bottle with old bolts and nuts. I attached an eye hook to the cap of the bottle. I then added roofing gravel from the gutters to fill around the bolts as added weight and hung it below the pulley.

The result was the gate would slowly close back to near closed position where the gate starts to slide onto the guide plate that has a beveled start to it. It then supports the weight of the gate and is ready for the final push into the locked position. This will be especially great when entering the room for tools and I am not running trains or for guests who might not otherwise know how to close the gate completely. This gate locks in place with a cabinet door magnet and the final push is all it takes to run trains. The bottle I used was just a shade larger than a large water bottle from my pool chemicals. But your gate might do just fine with a large water bottle.

The actual gate, it's operation and the counterweight can be seen on my youtube page called "shrinehillrail". As you know a model railroad is never truly finished.
