

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

As I sit here and think about what to write for this column, I have a couple of things I want to bring some positive attention to.

This quarter I am starting with my Superintendent hat, I'm going to switch to my Contest Manager hat, and then wrap the column up with my Super hat again. Hat change #1 By the time this is published the new CID contest season will have ended. At this time the top two places are uncatchable by anyone else. The only thing I am positive about is that Dan will be the first place and Dan will be in second place. As Dan is currently in second place, I have tried to keep up with Dan Hinel and make him work for the win. We will both enjoy catching a breath at the end of this season! This contest year has been so much fun. I hope you have all enjoyed it as well. That brings me to the survey I sent out. I am still getting a response or two trickling in and I haven't had time yet to develop next year's game plan, but I REALLY appreciate those who took the time to respond!

I would love to say I engineered the contest system, but the truth is I borrowed it from the Louisville and Cincy guys. They had the kinks worked out rather nicely. I made a few changes here or there and we rolled with it. I made a lot of assumptions along the way and even more guesses. Contest participants pushed the envelope with every contest, and I loved that! Sometimes it made me scramble to figure out how to deal with boundaries being pushed but I think it made people more creative. Sometimes thinking what you think is the right answer turns out to be very wrong. I had thought some cash prizes, with first place covering the cost of your NMRA membership for the year, would be a good incentive. The responders to the survey let me know that isn't the case at all. There was an option to pick good prize amounts or leave an 'OTHER' option. I expected that OTHER to be a differing amount than

what I listed. What it turned out to be was a strong reaction that it wasn't a good prize. What turned out to be the desired prize was a plaque or other wall hanging recognition. We hand out quite a few certificates for different things in the CID and I thought that a plaque might be just more of the same and not exciting. I was wrong! While I can't say in this column what all changes I will make to the coming year, I can say we will drop the cash prizes and develop some bragging rights worthy plaques.

I also asked about splitting the year into quarters that reset to zero points for the next quarter making 4 winning groups each year. Increased fun at modeling is my number one goal with the contest. I don't want runaway contests. What the responders told me was that they enjoyed having a clear leader to chase after. The suggestions on how to split the season were all over the place with some being ok with the contest done the way we did this year and others liking quarterly. One person responded, 'Maybe semiannually?" I think that is the way we will likely go. I also asked about making the winners ineligible for the next season. No one was in favor of that. I think I will figure out some form of handicapping though.

One of the last sections was a freeform section to tell me anything about the contest or the CID that you think I should know. This is where I switch my hat back to the super's hat. I was pleased with the responses I got. Not because they were all patted on the back. They weren't. One person told me they didn't participate as much because they didn't know what was happening in the division because we didn't welcome them in a timely manner or give them much information. That is a shortcoming I very much want to hear but it makes me sad. I have already developed a game plan to correct that. New members won't have to deal with that, and we will have already caught up with new members. Thank you for taking the time to tell us what we aren't doing so well.

I have asked in the past for feedback but received little of it. I realized that is largely due to having to attach your name to the feedback and that makes some people uncomfortable. To remedy that and give you a chance to leave anonymous feedback I have created a google form that will stay active as long as I am superintendent. I will check every week or two and see if there are new comments. There is an option to leave me an email address if you want



## JOHN'S JUNCTION by John Robert Coy, MMR®

Here is the third installment in a series of articles involving the Achievement Program (AP). (AP Author Certificate)



Your CID board is following a NMRA directive: "Whenever possible, Division events should include a short reminder

should include a short reminder about the AP..."

Author! Author! I've heard that yelled-out by an audience after a fantastic performance. It is my hope and goal that one day I will write words worth plagiarizing! LOL

That is a worthy goal. However, a realistic achievable one is most certainly within your reach. I'm writing about, of course, the Author Certificate.

Generally speaking, getting published is no easy feat. Some people try for years and never succeed. Then there are the select few who end-up on the New York Times best seller list!

However, you have an open avenue for publication. I'm closing in on five years as a Member of the NMRA. Since day one, our Publisher of the Rusty Spike, Keith Clark, has upon many occasions, asked people (YOU!) to submit articles, because seemingly it has been a challenge to fill the pages of our Rusty Spike.

The same is true with the Waybill—our newsletter—for our entire Midwest Region. On more than one occasion, in fact, very, very often, I have heard the plea for submissions. Just last night, May 27, 2023, on Facebook—the AP--Master Model Railroad site—a Region was asking for stories involving the AP.

So, there you have it! That is a brief range of publication options open to you to get an article published. And, those places are just the tip of the iceberg. The point I'm trying to make here is that it with reasonable reach to get an article published within the NMRA.

Now, the question becomes: What do I write about? The answer is: Model Railroading and or other subject matter related to model railroading. Chances are that if you are reading this article, you are a model railroader. There are a good number of you

who have been model railroading for years.

You may write about your current layout. Tell its story! How did you create it? What was your thought process? How long did you have it? Do you still have it?

How many layouts have you constructed or helped to construct? What scale(s) was the layout(s) built in? Any special features? Was it built for operation or display or both?

What is your favorite model that you ever built? How did you build it? Have you ever entered models into contests or just for display? I could sit here all day and throw out suggestions. EVERYONE has a story tell. When did you join the NMRA? Why would you encourage others to join us? That would be interesting. What is your greatest buy at a train show? What is your favorite railroad and why?

On the official NMRA AP pages under the Author category that are explanations, table, charts, etc. outlining the criteria to earn this certificate. So, I will not be redundant and post that here.

I will say that for a rule of thumb, as quote from that page, 1200 words constitutes a page. However, don't take that for an absolute. When in doubt, consult with CID AP Chair Dan Hinel. That may sound like a large number of words. It is only roughly 3 pages on a standard sheet of paper. That isn't much. And, when you include images with your article, that quickly fills space. Images do count for Author points as well.

In fact, if another person writes the article and you took the photos—the photos published will earn Author points for you.

You need forty-two points to earn your certificate. That is easily within reach and even better you help the NMRA by providing content for others to enjoy. Everyone has entertaining stories to share!

Please understand that for the exact same article you can ONLY earn points for it one time. So, if your article is used at Division level and is also used in a regional publication you may only count the points for it ONE TIME. Bear in mind, that you DOUBLE points at Regional Level versus Division level. Read the official rules please.

The NMRA Magazine, or a national publication, would earn even more points—and some national publications will even pay you—even better! However, paid publications are much more of a challenge to have an article accepted. It can be done!

What are you waiting for? I certainly would like to see an article from you.

# Why Weather Rolling Stock

#### **Cars Before Weathering**

For example; when you buy some rolling stock it comes packaged all shiny, plastic and new.

It probably looks too perfect, unreal and out of place alongside the other cars on the track. It may need "roughing up" to make it look used, or at least to show some signs of wear and tear.

It really comes down to deciding if want to "roughup" the factory paint job on the very expensive rolling stock you've just purchased. But, like it or not, shiny new cars usually look out of place on an otherwise "used looking" layout.



#### **Cars After Weathering**

In reality; most cars on a railroad, show varying degrees of rust, grime (lube and oil), mud, soot, denting, scratches and some are even covered in graffiti. However, cars do vary in age and usage, so they shouldn't necessarily all look the same. And, not

everything is dirty, because the contact on bare metal can keep some areas of a car clean.

So, it is a case of thinking carefully about the age and likely wear and tear that you want to mimic... and whether you are prepared to "rough-up" your rolling stock for the sake of adding realism.

Also, think about the region or era you are recreating. Is it likely to be muddy at times or would it be more dusty and arid like in a desert? For example, the rolling stock might need a sun-bleached look, which can be achieved with Dullcoat brushed over with some rubbing alcohol. This will give the model a kind of a white milky haze. If you don't like it, respray with Dullcoat. However, always test techniques on something else before you try them out on your prized models, because you may not like the effect.



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

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
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


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
